

## How to find the meaning of abbreviations?

If you are faced with an abbreviation for a law report or journal which you do not recognize, look in any of the following works (all of which are available in the Library):

Of course, there is the **Cardiff Index to Legal Abbreviation** available online at <u>http://www.legalabbrevs.cardiff.ac.uk/</u> which allows searching <u>by abbreviation</u> to determine the full title of a publication or <u>by law report/journal title</u> to discover the correct abbreviation. This online index is very easy to use.

More than one law report or journal may have the same abbreviation; look closely at the subject of the law report series or the jurisdiction to identify the most likely title.
